

Pastor's Note

"THE PLAGUE YEAR" OF 1918

₩ hen the Boston Red Sox won the World Series at Fenway Park on September 11th, 1918, the victory of the hometown team was eclipsed by a public health calamity known to history as the "Spanish Flu". From September to November a terrible influenza epidemic swept the world, killing 20-100 million people. It was 25% more deadly than more ordinary flu's. In this short span of time 28% of the U.S. population was stricken. So many died that the average life-span in the USA fell by 12 years in 1918.

In the United States this killer flu began in Boston when sailors on a troop ship began falling seriously ill on August 28th. Within a week the illness had spread to the civilian population in Boston. On September 8th The flu appeared at Ft. Devens, thirty miles west of Boston, devastating the camp which was filled with young soldiers preparing to reinforce the Allied troops fighting in Europe.

This "Spanish Flu" (so-called because it had first appeared in Spain earlier that year, highly contagious but not so lethal as when it reappeared in the fall) seemed targeted to strike young, healthy adults. Many Americans thought this flu was a German plot—germ-warfare brought into Boston Harbor by agents off a German submarine, as one rumor had it. (*Gina Kolata: "Flu, the Story of the Great Influenza Pandemic of 1918 and the Search for the Virus that Caused It", A.D. 1999.*) A play by Horton Foote (later made into a feature film) "1918", set in Texas during the Epidemic, captures something of the horror and sadness.

In my own family history, the Spanish Flu took its toll. My maternal grandmother's younger sister died: she was only seven. My grandmother told my that she remembered the endless procession of funeral hearses driving by her house in those weeks, day after day after day. My paternal grandfather's mother died, a woman in her prime, leaving behind a husband and four children behind. My paternal grandmother was a little girl of 10. She was lucky: she survived the disease although she had a long convalescence.

To this day, medical science has not been able to explain why this influenza-like disease was so lethal. The historical memory of the event itself has been collapsed into the history of World War I.

What strikes us looking back is how contingent and fragile our life is. God spare us another such event as the fall of 1918. But how important it is for us to keep our souls clean against a "sudden and unprovided death".

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH

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GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 4:14-30

After His fasting in the wilderness, Jesus returns to Galilee "in the power of the Spirit" to begin His public ministry (v. 14). Having laid aside His carpentry tools, He assumes the office of rabbi in his hometown synagogue. The text reveals to us that all the people (presumably many relatives and friends)

wondered at His preaching. All along, they had known Him merely as one of their own, but the time had come for them to encounter Him as their Lord, as well. For this to occur, they needed the grace of the Holy Spirit to recognize Him as the God-man. The same is true for us. In the words of St. Paul, "no one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:3).

Consequently, one of the major characteristics of St. Luke's Gospel is the frequent mention of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is *always* mentioned in connection with the recognition of Jesus' identity as Son of God and Messiah. He is clearly present at the Annunciation (1:35), the Visitation (1:39-55), the Presentation in the Temple (2:27), and the Baptism (3:22), all of which are mysteries of the Rosary. Jesus himself explains that the Holy Spirit bears witness to Him, leading his followers into "all truth" (John 15:26, 16:13-14).

Therefore, St. Luke introduces the public ministry of Jesus with a programmatic quotation

from the prophet Isaiah, telling us exactly *who* Jesus is, and what He has come to earth to do, as the commentators note. Fittingly, the first line with which Jesus heralds His ministry is this: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me," quoting Isaiah 61:1. This passage foretells a time of healing and restoration for the people of Israel, after returning from Babylonian captivity. Isaiah describes the Messiah as the one who will bring salvation to people in distress.

Jesus authoritatively claims this divine Messiahship (4:21). Many of the Jews of that time, however, were expecting the Messiah to be a political hero who would promote Jewish national interests. This is precisely why they rejected Jesus: His reign was (and is) characterized by mercy to the poorest and His delivering them from the oppression of sin, the flesh, and the devil. Herein lies another of St. Luke's major themes: salvation to the nations, i.e., to non-Jews. Jesus detects unbelief and incredulity in the people of Nazareth, who could not equate the poor carpenter they knew with their conception of the Messiah, and thus, did not believe in Him. This is what is meant by Jesus' allusion to two episodes in the Old Testament where God showed mercy to suffering people who were not part of Israel (cf. I Kings 17, II Kings 5).

The heart of Jesus' message of salvation is His *limitless* love and compassion, as our Holy Father Pope Francis so frequently points out to us in his homilies. Each of us experiences some form of poverty, whether material, spiritual, emotional, or moral, for which we need good news. This good news consists in God delivering us from the captivity of sin and its disastrous effects in our lives. Iesus proclaimed this deliverance first in a liturgical setting with the public hearing of the word of God. To what degree do we prepare mentally and spiritually to hear the truth of the Scriptures at Mass, so as to encounter Jesus as our Lord and Master in the Sacrament of the Altar? It is there that He tenderly relieves our burdens with His infinite compassion, and brings "liberty to captives," and "let [s] the oppressed go free" (4:18).

GUEST SPEAKER PRESENTATION NEXT SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 24th


See some of the most enchanting paintings from art history on Sunday, November 24th at 12:30 PM in the Lower Church Hall. Gwyneth Holston, a Catholic



For they themselves relate of us what manner of entering in we had unto you; and how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, and to wait for His Son from heaven (Whom He raised from the dead), Jesus, who hath delivered us from the wrath to come.


