

Pastor's Note

INAUGURAL SERMON OF DEACON RIVERA, S.J.

Mary Immaculate of Lourdes Church, 9 AM Mass, October 4th, 2015



Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time: Lectionary 140

Brethren,

On October 3th, 2015, I received the grace of ordination to the diaconate. Today I have the task of breaking this holy word to you in order to feed, to strengthen, and to confirm your faith. Now, you see me and may say: Who is he to come here and speak to us? Who is this stranger? Indeed, Who am I to do this? I am young, but I preach the One who "grew in wisdom, and age, and grace with God and men"; I do not have wisdom of human eloquence, but I preach the "foolishness of God...wiser than human wisdom". In other words, I do not bring either gold or silver to make you materially rich, I give only what I have: Jesus Christ, "the power of God and the wisdom of God". O most kind Jesus, I ask You, break your bread for those who are hungering for it; by my hands, if You want, but by Your own power.

Therefore, let us hear what this same Christ, the Truth, spoke today. He said: "what God has joined together, no human being must separate". How can we understand this mystery? We certainly do not want to understand it like the Pharisees, for they do not approach Jesus in order to learn from Him, but to test Him. Their hearts are divided; they do not care for the truth. Instead, let us approach Jesus with humility and He will teach us all that we need to know for our salvation.

Let me try to unravel some of this mystery. The blessed Apostle John says: "God is Love". Therefore, what God has joined, in other words, what Love has joined together, let no human being separate. God is love. But, where do we find love? I say: "Open your eyes! You are seeing it now!" God's love is shown in marriage. Among us there are married couples: what a beautiful thing: a man and a woman together! Moreover, what a beautiful thing to see the fruits of love, namely, their children! Those crying babies, those playful children: they are a sign of God's love. They are God's signature declaring that love transforms us: those who were two now become one.

Therefore, in one level, the Gospel today declares that when a man and a woman join their lives in holy matrimony, God makes them one. But, is this Gospel applicable exclusively to married couples? What about those who are not married or choose a celibate life? Is this truth not for them too? Yes, this Gospel is for everyone. Thus, love must be present in all our relationships and what love has joined no human being must separate. For no sphere of human relationships is exempted from the influence of love.

My brothers and sister, when sin entered the world God's unity was destroyed. Consequently, divorce is a sign of sin; broken relationships are a sign of sin; disunity is a sign of sin. It is sin that rejects God's love. Sin is a tragedy, but sin does not have the last word, sin is our enemy and we fight against it with God's grace given to us by the power of Christ, namely, by His death and resurrection. Think about this: love on Earth mirrors God's love and unity in the Trinity. Is the Father unfaithful to the Son? No. Is the Son unfaithful to the Father? No. Has the Holy Spirit declared his independence from the Father and the Son? No. Is God unfaithful to us? No. Has he ever abandoned us? No. Ceased to love us? Certainly no. The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, yesterday, today and tomorrow one God desires to be one with us. God is love and Love has declared that what He

joins together, no one can separate: "Who can separate us from Christ's love?" – asked the blessed Paul – "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers... nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord".

My brothers and sisters, if this is the case, how are we living out our love for God? How are we becoming one with God according to our particular vocation as husband, wife, son, daughter, friend? Is my life a sign of unity or disunity? Do I imitate the Trinity's faithfulness to human beings or do I foster division and destruction of the bonds of love? Consequently, in our own lives, let us imitate the faithfulness and commitment that exists within the Trinity. Let us mirror God's love to the world! "Love is stronger than death". Let us pray together for families, married couples, and all relationships. May God continue to bless them and may God continue to give His Church the strength to defend them. Amen!

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 23:13-32

When Jesus returns to Pilate from Herod's court, Pilate insists upon Jesus' innocence, and asserts his desire to release Him after scourging Him (vv. 13-16). As long as there was no revolt against the state, the Romans were fairly tolerant of other religions. Nevertheless, chastising with scourging was a

clear message to the people that the Romans were in charge, lest any try to incite religious or political revolt. Scourging, while not entirely as gruesome as portrayed in Mel Gibson's *The Passion of the Christ*, was nevertheless an utterly debilitating and even lethal form of punishment. As the Shroud of Turin reveals (and there is far more evidence in favor of its authenticity than not) Our Lord's *entire Body* was covered with scourge wounds. One can scarcely imagine how Jesus carried His cross without Simon of Cyrene's aid (v. 26).

In view of the horror of scourging, we must note the cruelty and utter madness of the crowds. Unsatisfied with what they consider to be a lenient sentence by Pilate, they forcefully demand Our Lord's crucifixion and the release of Barabbas, a man who actually deserved capital punishment for homicide and insurrection (vv. 18-25). As many commentators note, there is a sad irony in Barabbas' name, which means "son of the father," for the *true* Son of the Father receives this evil man's sentence. Ultimately, Pilate acquiesces to the demands of the crowds only because of the threat of civil disturbance. He fails as a judge by condemning an innocent man to death, valuing the veneer of public order more than true justice.

Now we begin Jesus' *Via Dolorosa*, His sorrowful journey to Calvary. Firstly, we must reflect on what carrying Jesus' cross would have... *(continued on page 6...)*

meant to Simon of Cyrene (v. 26). The cross was the most shameful kind of capital punishment. For someone to carry the cross of a condemned man was to participate in total shame. Imagine Simon's horror as he is caught amidst an angry crowd and unexpectedly snatched up for this undesirable task.

Simon and his family appear to have been known to the Roman Church that originally received St. Mark's Gospel, for it mentions Simon as "the father of Alexander and Rufus" (cf. Mk. 15:21). Imagine the profound change in Simon as he participated in the liturgy a few years later: he could place himself in this eternal commemoration of Jesus' sacrifice in a uniquely special way, having been one of its key players. Perhaps he was also familiar with the following teaching of St. Paul: "Bear one another's burdens, and so you will fulfill the law of Christ," and "may I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" (cf. Gal. 6:2,14). These words would have been particularly meaningful for him. Additionally, as some commentaries aptly observe, Simon brings to mind Jesus' earlier teaching: "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (cf. Lk. 9:23). How truly he could understand the weight of these words!

St. Luke's Passion narrative gives us a brief exchange between Jesus and the women of Jerusalem during the *Via Dolorosa* (vv. 27-31). Firstly, we must note the courage of these women: they dared to accompany Jesus to the bitter end, whereas all of the disciples except for St. John fled in fear. What a lesson for us in fortitude, compassion, and solidarity. Even as they mourn for Jesus, however, Our Lord tells them to mourn for the coming destruction of Jerusalem. As the commentary in the Ignatius Study Bible explains, Jesus borrows prophetic language from Ezekiel, and the "dry wood" is a symbol for the city awaiting fiery destruction. As we have seen multiple times, so here, too: Our Lord is able to reach out to others, even as He is engulfed in His own suffering. May He give us the supernatural strength not only to bear our cross, but to exercise compassion for others while doing so.

LATIN MASS PROPERS: TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

COLLECT Lord, we pray Thee, keep Thy household the Church in continual godliness; that through Thy protection it may be free from all adversities, and devoutly given to good works, to the glory of Thy holy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Ephesians 6: 10-17 Brethren: Be strengthened in the Lord, and in the might of His power. Put you on the armour of God, that you may be able to stand against the deceits of the devil. For our wrestling is not against flesh and blood, but against principalities and powers, against the rulers of the world of this darkness, against the spirits of wickedness in the high places. Therefore, take unto you the armour of God, that you may be able to resist in the evil day, and to stand in all things perfect; stand therefore having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of justice, and your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; in all things taking the shield of faith, wherewith you may be able to extinguish all the fiery darts of the most wicked one. And take unto you the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit which is the word of God.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18: 23-35 At that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of Heaven is likened to a king, who would take an account of his servants. And when he had begun to take the account, one was brought to him that owed him ten thousand talents: and as he had not wherewith to pay it, his lord commanded that he should be sold, and his wife and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made. But that servant falling down, besought him saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And the lord of that servant, being moved with pity, let him go, and forgave him the debt. But when that servant was gone out, he found one of his fellow-servants that owed him a hundred pence: and laying hold of him, he throttled him, saying: Pay what thou owest. And his fellow-servant falling down besought him, saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And he would not; but went and cast him into prison till he paid the debt. Now his fellowservants, seeing what was done, were very much grieved; and they came and told their lord all that was done. Then his lord called him, and saith to him: Thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all the debt, because thou besoughtest me; shouldst not thou then have had compassion also on thy fellow-servant, even as I had compassion on thee? And his lord being angry delivered him to the torturers until he paid all the debt. So also shall my heavenly Father do to you, if you forgive not every one his brother from vour hearts.














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
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
