

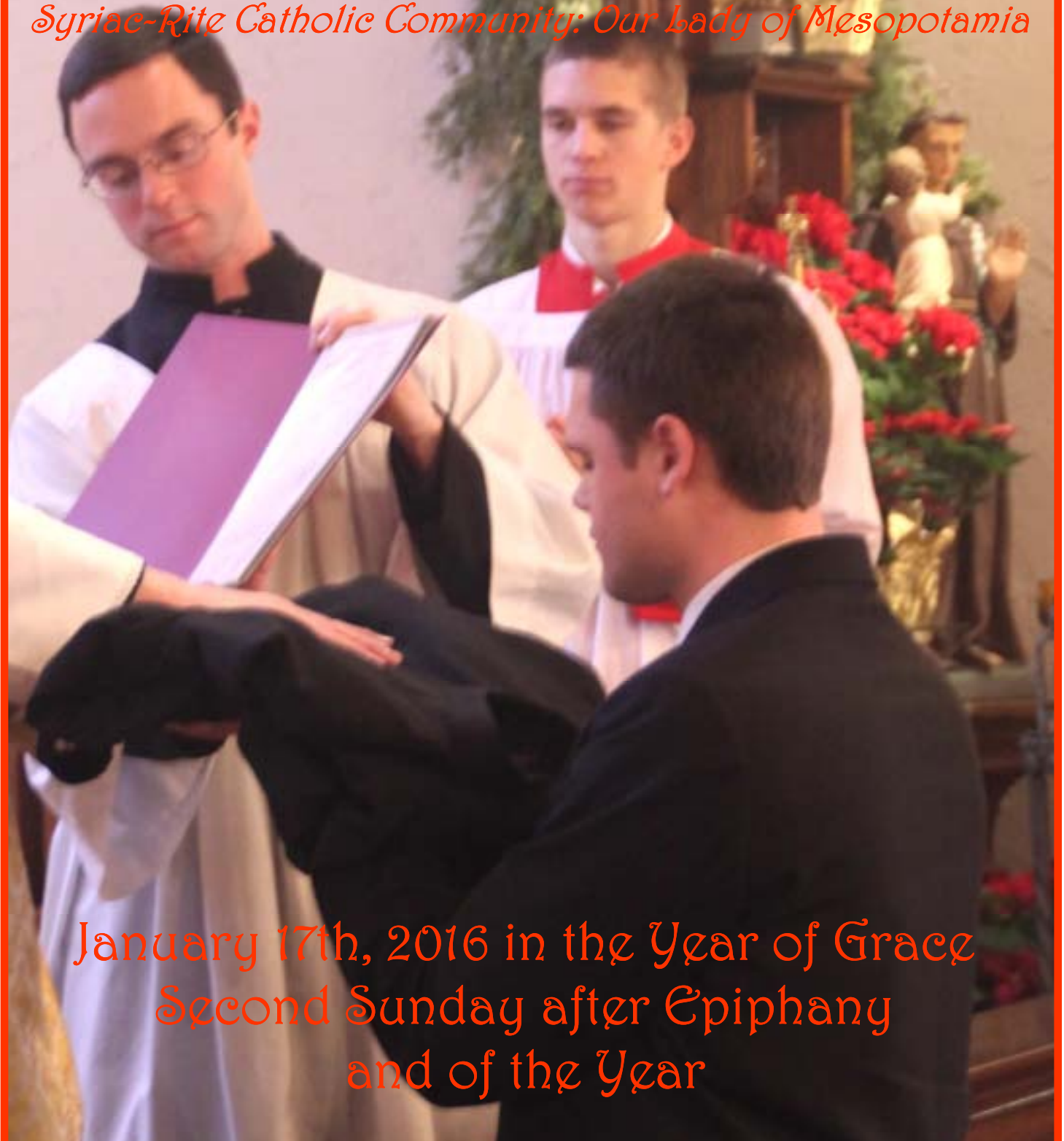

Pastor's Note

THE "CALL"

The Gospel Lesson for this Sunday relates the First Public Miracle that Jesus did, changing the water into wine at the Wedding Feast of Cana. In concluding the story, St. John emphasizes that this was a sign which strengthened the belief of the first group of Jesus' disciples in Him: *"This beginning of miracles did Jesus in Cana of Galilee; and manifested His glory, and His disciples believed in Him."* (John 2:11)

In the Church's understanding of discipleship, there is the primary and necessary vocation to believe in Christ, receive His Baptism, and become a member of His visible Church on earth. It is necessary to make use of the grace God has given us to save our own soul. Within the life of the Church, however, there is also recognized, in addition to the call to live out our baptismal vows, that distinctive way of life which is a continuation of the call of Christ to specific individuals to leave their former way of life in order to follow Him completely. *"And Jesus said to Simon [Peter]: Do not be afraid: henceforth thou shalt be a fisher of men. And when they had brought their boats to land, they left all and followed Him."* (Luke 5:11) We see this call being lived out in our midst through the ministry of the ordained and the various institutes of consecrated life.

I want to recognize the men from our parish who are presently responding to that inner call they have felt to serve Christ and His Church by leaving the life of "the world" for the life of religion.

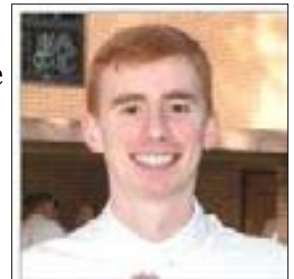
Among the men ordained to the transitional diaconate by Cardinal Sean on January 9th, was one of the men sponsored by our parish, **Stephen LeBlanc**. Deacon LeBlanc is currently serving at St. Joseph Parish in Medway. I am hopeful that he will be able to diaconate at one of our Sunday Masses in the

near future and then after his ordination to the priesthood in May, he will celebrate his Mass here at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes.

As you can see from our front-cover this week, parishioner Cameron MacKenzie has moved a step further in testing his religious vocation with the Brothers of the Slaves of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, by entering into the novitiate and taking a new name in religion as **Brother Martin de Porres**.



On the Vigil of Christmas, Paul Juhasz, brother and brother-in-law of parishioners Chris and Sharon Juhasz, entered the novitiate of the Norbertine Fathers of St. Michael's Abbey in California. He also took a new name in religion:



Frater (Brother) Gerard Sagredo, patron of Budapest, Hungary. (Paul was a full parishioner here at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes during his senior year in high school.)

Deacon Jon Tveit—former parishioner, sacristan and cantor—was ordained for the Archdiocese of New York last fall and will be ordained to the priesthood this spring. Also, at various stages of seminary formation are parish men studying for the Archdiocese of Boston, **Brian O'Hanlon** and **Earl Smith**, and **Tyler Molisse**, who is in his first year with the Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY SECOND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY Romans 12:6-16

St. Paul's discussion in today's Epistle from Romans 12 of the various gifts given to believers immediately follows his analogy of the Church as a body with many members. As he explains, *"For as in one body we have many members, and all the members do not have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another"* (vv. 4-5, RSV). Thus, both the clergy and the laity have an integral responsibility to their own particular parish community in specific ways: *"Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them"* (v. 6, RSV-1 will use this translation for the rest of this post). Let's go through these gifts and consider some basic applications for our lives today.

"if prophecy, in proportion to our faith." In the early Church, the gift of prophecy was common enough, and those who had this gift would speak during the Sunday liturgy for the edification of the assembly. This gift is no longer part of normal parish life for various legitimate reasons that cannot be explored in this post. Authentic prophecy, however, both in Scripture and Church history, is characterized by its coherent agreement with and humble submission to the doctrine of the faith. The faith to which St. Paul refers here is not the personal faith of the one who prophesies, but the objective faith of the Church. Today, the Church thoroughly investigates and tests the authenticity of private Marian apparitions, for example, according to her objective faith.

"if service, in our serving." The Greek word here is that from which our word for deacon is derived. St. Paul may possibly be referring to this order in the Church, but more likely to service more generally amongst all the faithful.

"he who teaches, in his teaching; he who exhorts, in his exhortation." While the clergy have a distinct office of teaching, the laity are also called to be evangelists and catechists in their own right.

Every parent is called to know and teach the faith to their children. Indeed, every Catholic should be ready to explain their faith to relatives and friends who do not know Our Lord, or don't know him very well (cf. 1 Pet. 3:15).

"he who contributes, in liberality; he who gives aid, with zeal; he who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness." The real question in the stewardship of our parish ought not to be, *"what can I spare of what's left over?"* but rather, *"what more could I prudently and joyfully give?"*

The rest of today's Epistle contains moral guidance akin to what we heard last week in Colossians 3. Perhaps one of the most helpful exhortations in this section is in v. 10: *"outdo one another in showing honor."* In an audio recording of a talk on marriage and family given by Fr. John Ricardo, he notes that husbands and wives should always be seeking to outdo one another in showing love, for this makes for a happy marriage and a happy home. This principle can be applied to the household of the Church, as well. It undergirds what we find in v. 13: *"Contribute to the needs of the saints, practice hospitality."*

As we enter quickly into pre-Lent and Lent, let us begin thinking about specific and practical ways we can be more loving to our spouses, children, relatives, friends, and neighbors. Let us also take the opportunity to give alms to our parish's St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fund, which assists Fr. Desire and his parish mission of the Immaculate Conception in Liberia, as well as our persecuted Catholic brethren in Iraq, to whom our parish is connected through the Iraqi mission of Our Lady of Mesopotamia.

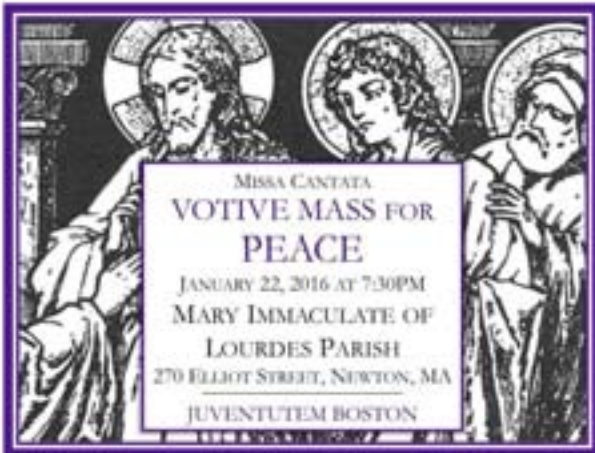

COLLECT Almighty and everlasting God, who dost govern all things in heaven and earth, mercifully hear the prayers of Thy people, and grant us Thy peace all the days of our life. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Romans 12: 6-16 Brethren: Having different gifts, according to the grace that is given us: either prophecy, to be used according to the rule of faith; or ministry, in ministering; or he that teacheth, in doctrine; he that exhorteth, in exhorting; he that giveth, with simplicity; he that ruleth, with carefulness; he that showeth mercy, with cheerfulness. Let love be without dissimulation. Hating that which is evil, cleaving to that which is good: loving one another with the charity of brotherhood: with honor preventing one another: in carefulness not slothful: in spirit fervent: serving the Lord: rejoicing in hope: patient in tribulation: instant in prayer: communicating to the necessities of the saints: pursuing hospitality. Bless them that persecute you: bless, and curse not. Rejoice with them that rejoice, weep with them that weep: being of one mind towards one another; not minding high things, but consenting to the humble.

GRADUAL: Psalm 106. 20-21 The Lord sent His word, and healed them: and delivered them from their destruction. V. Let the mercies of the Lord give glory to Him: and His wonderful works to the children of men.

And the wine failing, the mother of Jesus saith to Him: They have no wine. And Jesus saith to her: Woman, what is that to Me and to Thee? My hour is not yet come. His mother saith to the waiters: Whatsoever He shall say to you, do ye. Now there were set six water-pots of stone, according to the manner of the purifying of the Jews, containing two or three measures apiece*. Jesus saith to them: Fill the water-pots with water. And they filled them up to the brim. And Jesus said to them: Draw out now, and carry to the chief steward of the feast. And they carried it. And when the chief steward had tasted the water made wine, and knew not whence it was, but the waiters knew who had drawn the water: the chief steward calleth the bridegroom, and saith to him: Every man at first setteth forth good wine: and when men have well drunk, then that which is worse: but thou hast kept the good wine until now. This beginning of miracles did Jesus in Cana of Galilee; and manifested His glory, and His disciples believed in Him.*

Preface of the Holy Trinity

COMMUNION: John 2. 7, 8, 9, 10-11 The Lord saith: Fill the water, and carry to the chief steward. When the chief steward had tasted the water made wine, he saith to the bridegroom: Thou hast kept the good wine until now. This first miracle did Jesus in the presence of His disciples.

POSTCOMMUNION May the operation of Thy power be increased within us; we beg Thee, O Lord, that being quickened by Thy divine sacraments, we made by Thy bounty, be prepared to receive that which they promise. Through our Lord.**The Jews wash their hands several times before eating (St. Mark 7. 3). One measure would contain about 8½ gallons. Each water-pot, therefore, held between 17 and 25½ gallons and the six together between 102 and 153 gallons.*
